Exactly one year ago this week, Aux Petits Soins moved into its home on Michigan Avenue. When I signed the lease in October 2015, all I had were a few teaching supplies and a head full of ideas. One year later we have a working classroom with a drawer system, wall decorations, and

"seasonal" area carpets; a bustling activity center with custom-made shelving units, tables and chairs, as well as hundreds of books, toys and games imported from France; and in the main room, there's now a nursery, a reception desk, and a snack area for the children.

I'm happy with the progress we've made, and I can't wait to finish it off by adding more books to the library, building a café/boutique area, and giving the interior a Parisian design scheme. However, there's more in store for Aux Petits Soins than cosmetic refinements. We're currently built around teaching children how to speak French, but immersion learning doesn't end with language — and it doesn't have to end with children, either.

My mission is to to grow Aux Petits Soins into an all-ages French cultural center within the next year. The space will complement the learning of our students by having everything they can touch, hear, and see be faithful to the French culture. I envision it becoming a place where anyone can spend time relaxing in an authentic French atmosphere — I want everyone will feel like they're stepping into Paris when they step into Aux Petits Soins.

More new programs

New Aux Petits Soins programs have been regularly added since we opened last year, keeping up with all the requests for more immersion opportunities and new classroom programs. This month, I'm taking the leap to begin offering programs that aren't based on classroom learning, but take a more open-door approach.

Next Tuesday, October 11, Aux Petits Soins will launch French Playtime, a new program that will be free for current Aux Petits Soins students age 6 and under. Children with an adult caregiver will have access to all Aux Petits Soins toys and books, and there will be someone on-site to read stories and play with them exclusively in French. This will enable students to practice what they've learned in class and continue their French immersion. French Playtime will be held 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 4-6 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, and 9-11:30 a.m. on Saturdays.

Not currently a student? Not a problem. This month we're also launching the new APS Membership Program to give parents and children the opportunity to sample some of our services without committing to a weekly curriculum. And because our aim has always been to be part of the community, admission to French Playtime will always be free on the first Friday of each month.

The next step is creating new opportunities for elementary school-aged children. For the kids aged 6-12, Aux Petits Soins will soon launch the APS French Club, an interactive group designed to give kids a chance to use the French they've already learned in a dynamic social setting. APS French Club members will be split into small groups based on age, skill level, and interest. They will then be given something to do, such as a board game or a special hands-on activity that will be conducted entirely in French and led by an APS employee or volunteer. APS French Club will meet for two hours on Saturday afternoons. Stay tuned for more details.

French for grownups

And finally — finally! — after over a year of getting requests, Aux Petits Soins has reached the stage where we can start to offer programs for grownups. Starting this winter, we plan to start a series of classes that will be led by a native French speaker with the help of a non-native speaker "assistant." Of course, as with everything else with Aux Petits Soins, all classes

will be conducted entirely in French. Proposed activities include instructional cooking and painting seminars, with future ideas including movie nights and special guest speakers. If you know any native French speakers who might be interested in leading one of these classes, please connect them with us.

And before you start worrying that a class in French will be too difficult for you, I have no doubt that everyone will be able to understand, given the unique way I intend to have it structured. Learning a foreign language is like getting a passport to immerse yourself in a foreign culture, and I hope that the native speaker will bring some authenticity by using a rich repertoire of vocabulary and expressions. The non-native speakers will facilitate this by finding bridges to understanding. Your desire to connect with the French culture is the reason why you will want to be able to communicate in French. In other words, your enthusiasm is the key of your success. It is more challenging, but still quite possible, to pick up or improve foreign languages as an adult, with studies showing that active and enthusiastic learners are more successful.
